Nursery

What things can we do to keep our bodies healthy?

We have been busy getting ready for the Art Open House next week. Can you remember some of the art you created? Could you recreate it at home?

We spent an hour in Reception this week. What was your favourite activity?

Reception

Literacy: What do you think Lola was thinking when her sister gave her peas to eat?

Maths: What two numbers can go together to make 10? What other number bonds to 10 can you think of?

Phonics: Can you think of some words that end in the suffix 'est'? e.g. smoothest

Year 1

English: Can you write instructions on how to look after your favourite toy?

Maths: Find 5 coins at home. Can you add them together?
