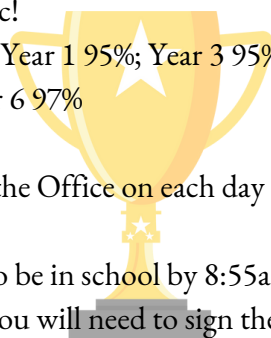

# What Three Questions?

## Nursery

What grows out of a seed?

What do seeds need to grow?

We are learning about more than and less than. Can you find some objects and put them in two groups? Then ask your child if they know which is more.

## Reception

Maths: What is a 'part' of the number 8? And what is the 'whole'?

Topic (Space): What city and country do we live in?

Phonics: What is a compound word? Can you think of an example?

## Year 1

Science: Why are the roots important for a plant to grow?

Maths: Can you roll a dice 3 times and all the digits together?

English: Can you write a fact file about your favourite London landmark?

## Year 2

Maths: How can you use the place value method to add  $54 + 37$

English: What was life like in 1666 London?

RE: What is a baptism and why would a Christian choose to get baptised?

## Year 3

Science: What does photosynthesis do?

Maths: How many fractions can you think of that are equal to  $1/2$ ?

RE: What is the 4th concept of the Bible's Big Story?

## Year 4

Maths: Can you describe the pattern you see when completing the 12 times tables?

Science: What factors contribute to air pollution?

English: What is a non-chronological report and where might we see one?

## Year 5

English: What does it mean when a sentence is in the passive voice instead of the active voice?

R.E: What does the story of the woman being healed when she touched Jesus' clothes teach us about faith?

Art: How do the coil and pinching techniques help you shape clay in different ways?

## Year 6

Maths: What is the process for multiplying a mixed number by a whole number?

R.E: Why is the Bible translation important in helping the Christian message survive?

Science: What kingdoms are living things arranged into?
