

St Saviour's Remote Learning plan – information for parents

In the event that national or local restrictions require entire cohorts to remain at home, we will provide access to remote learning. The information below is a general guide, and we will provide you with further details specific to the actual situation should it arise.

Remote learning is currently facilitated by Tapestry in EYFS and Google Classroom in KS1 and KS2.

Child self-isolating	<p>EYFS: Nursery – daily rhyme/song Maths Challenge Read aloud Explorative play Reception – daily phonics Maths lesson Read aloud Explorative play</p> <p>KS1 and 2:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Maths: slides/activities following the maths being covered in the classroom will be provided via Google Classroom. Answers will be provided for self-marking at home. • Phonics (KS1 only): sessions/tasks focusing on the sounds your child will be missing • English: tasks will be uploaded to Google Classroom following the sequence of learning which is happening in the classroom. The quantity of these will be dependent on the age/needs of your child. Some of these may need to be submitted via Google Classroom for the teacher to mark. • Topic task(s): following the lessons being covered in class during the week. This may be the slides being shared on Google Classroom, along with activities if appropriate (i.e. the resources required are accessible at home). If the lessons being taught in class are not able to be delivered remotely, alternative topic learning will be set on Google Classroom. This may include using the Government's Oak Academy lessons.
Whole class/school closed	<p>All children will be asked to attend a Zoom 'registration' with their class teacher each morning. We will notify you of the time via Google Classroom. Children will also be asked to check-in each afternoon, via Google Classroom.</p> <p>EYFS: Nursery – daily rhyme/song Maths Challenge Read aloud Explorative play</p>

	<p>Reception – daily phonics Maths lesson Read aloud Explorative play</p> <p>KS1 and 2:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Maths: slides/activities following the maths that would have been covered in the classroom will be provided via Google Classroom. Answers will be provided for self-marking at home. • Phonics (KS1): sessions/tasks focusing on the sounds your child will be missing • English: tasks will be uploaded to Google Classroom following the sequence of learning which would have happened in the classroom. The quantity of these will be dependent on the age/needs of your child. Some of these may need to be submitted via Google Classroom for the teacher to mark. This will include spelling, grammar and reading lessons/activities. • Topic task(s): following the lessons that would have been covered in class during the week which can most easily be adapted to remote learning. The exact subjects taught will depend on the topic being covered, and any ‘missed’ subjects will be made up once the class returns to school. This may include using the Government’s Oak Academy lessons. • Small group video learning: this will look different depending on your child’s age and needs. The sessions may be reading sessions, maths sessions or writing sessions delivered by your child’s class teacher or another adult who works in their class. The sessions will run throughout the hours of the usual school day in small groups. The timing and frequency of the sessions will be communicated via Google Classroom and will take place via Zoom. • 1:1 support: if your child receives 1:1 support, a more bespoke programme will be set up for them. This may include video chats with one of the adults who works with them, but another member of school staff will be present for safeguarding reasons. They will usually still be expected to complete the rest of the learning set for their class. • Collective worship: there will be Collective Worship at least once a week, led by either Father Gary or Miss Granite.
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Teachers may choose to record videos of their teaching, depending on the subject being covered and the age of the children in the class. Lessons will not be live-streamed as this presents numerous safeguarding issues.
