

THE PUPIL PREMIUM ALLOCATION AT ST. SAVIOUR'S CE PRIMARY SCHOOL 2017-18

Background Information

There has long been a concern that children from disadvantaged backgrounds perform significantly less well than children from more affluent families. Children who have been eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) are often at risk of falling behind in their learning.

The Pupil Premium is a Government's initiative aimed at "narrowing the gap" in achievement between the children who have been eligible for FSM over the last six years when compared to other children within our school as well as nationally. This group of children is now called FSM Ever6.

The Pupil Premium (PP) for **2017-2018 is £1320** per FSM and FSM Ever6 child.

Another group of children who may have difficulties in school due to frequent moves around the country are those whose parents are in the Armed Forces. The Government also distributes £300 for every child eligible which is called The Service Premium. There is currently one child who qualifies for this support.

One child is subject to a Guardianship Order and the school receives an additional £1900 for this child.

At St. Saviour's CE Primary School, we are only able to narrow the gap so successfully because we have a rigorous and robust tracking and monitoring system to ensure all pupils, regardless of their starting point and personal situation, are making sufficient progress to meet and exceed their personal targets.

In 2012-13, St. Saviour's were delighted to accept an invitation to join Mayor Johnson's *London Schools Gold Club*. This is a prestigious award which recognises exceptional schools that have succeeded in improving pupils' aspirations and achievements. As the school now has less FSM children, we are no longer eligible for this award. However, we are confident our FSM and Ever 6 children continue to make good progress.

Principles

- We ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all pupils.
- We ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, this includes ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are adequately assessed and addressed.
- In making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all pupils who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged.
- We recognise also that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals (FSM). We reserve the rights to allocate the Pupil Premium funding to support any pupil or groups of pupils the school has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged. At least 70% of any group will be made up of FSM or FSM Ever6 children.
- Pupil Premium funding will be allocated following a needs analysis which will identify priority classes, groups or individuals.
- The total cost of provision described below is greater than the allocated Pupil Premium but Governors believe that this is a worthwhile investment which will have a positive impact on all our children.

Reporting Pupil Premium Expenditure

It is the responsibility of the Governors to explain PP Expenditure to parents in the form of an annual statement. There is not a set format for this and our report will be published annually on the school website. This report aims to detail information on how these funds are used at St. Saviour's. The report will include details of the attainment and progress of pupils who are covered by the premium and the intervention that has been supported by the additional funding.

Reports will also detail the progress made towards narrowing the gap and shall be supported by dated and academic progress. Regular reports will be presented on the progress of pupils supported by the PP to the Governors' Standards and Achievement Committee.

Provision

The Pupil Premium allocation is used to provide support and intervention strategies across the school for pupils receiving FSM or those that the school considered to be vulnerable pupils. All work through the Pupil Premium will be aimed at accelerating progress to ensure that children reach at least age expectations. Focus will be on English (particularly writing), Maths, communication and social skills.

Report for 2016-17

Impact 2016-2017

The impact of the support we give our FSM/Ever 6 children can be judged by the achievement at the end of Key Stage Two (Year Six) under the New Curriculum Assessment schedule. The results below show that most children supported by this additional funding achieved the National Standard or in some cases, the 'High' Standard. A summary is given in the table below.

This was the second year of the newly prescribed assessment system. Attention must be drawn to that there are still changes year on year which can affect teacher assessment.

In 2016-17,

- There was an improvement in attainment of Reading compared to 2015-16. The National Average for reading was 71% as opposed to 86% for St. Saviour's.
- Two out of six children spoke English as their second language (33%)
- 67% of our Free School Meal children achieved the standard across Reading, Writing and Maths compared to 42% nationally. 67% of our Pupil Premium children achieved the standard across Reading, Writing and Maths compared to 47% nationally. Both of these figures outline that children at St. Saviour's who are eligible for this additional funding are outperforming the rest of the country in this group.
- One child out of six FSM children didn't achieve the National Standard in Reading, however he was one mark away from a SS of 100.

- One child out of six FSM children didn't achieve the National Standard in Writing, due to dyslexic traits in spelling.
- Six of the FSM children achieved the National Standard in at least two subject areas (Reading, Writing and/or maths) signifying they were not failing across the curriculum.
- Two out of the six FSM children achieved the High Standard in Maths, and all six achieved the National Standard.

- The table below shows that the children in Year 2 (2016-17) who were in receipt of Pupil Premium outperformed the National average for Pupil Premium children across the country in all areas. This is particularly strong in those who were able to achieve Greater Depth.

Year 1 Phonics Screening Check (30 children in Year One) 2016-17

Three children were eligible for FSM (10%)

There were 3 children who failed the screening check across the cohort. One of these was FSM/Ever 6 and this child also has SEN needs.
